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Summary

Between the 10th and 12th February 2014 Oxford Archaeology East carried out an archaeological trench evaluation on land south of Pembroke Avenue, Waterbeach (TL 4895 6565).

The site revealed two clear phases of activity. On the eastern limit of site (Trench 6), Iron Age features were identified in the the form of a north-south aligned ditch and a number of postholes. The western portion of site contained post-medieval quarry pits and ditches (Trenches 2 and 3) along with two undated ditches which run parallel with Car Dyke (Trench 1).

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1 Introduction

1.1 Location and scope of work

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


Figure 1: Site location showing archaeological trenches (black) in development area (red)

- 1.1.1 An archaeological evaluation was conducted on land south of Pembroke Avenue, Waterbeach (548970, 265649) (Fig. 1).
- 1.1.2 These archaeological works were undertaken in accordance with a Brief issued by Dan McConnell of Cambridgeshire County Council (CCC), supplemented by a Specification prepared by OA East.

1.2 Aims and Methodology

- 1.2.1 The objective of this evaluation was to determine as far as reasonably possible the presence/absence, location, nature, extent, date, quality, condition and significance of any surviving archaeological deposits within the development area.
- 1.2.2 The Brief required that six 30m trenches (totalling 180 linear metres) be subject to investigation.
- 1.2.3 Machine excavation was carried out under constant archaeological supervision with a tracked 13 ton mechanical excavator using a 1.8m wide toothless ditching bucket.

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2 RESULTS

2.1 Introduction




Figure 2: Trench plan





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

- 2.1.1 Archaeological features were encountered in five of the six trenches (Fig. 2). Due to the small size of the evaluation, the archaeology will be discussed by trench. A comprehensive listing of trench depths, descriptions and related context data can be found in Appendix A.
- 2.1.2 Natural geology was encountered around 0.5m below ground level. Topsoil (01) consisted of a dark brown grey silty sand which contained high level of post-medieval debris. The subsoil (02) was a clean mid orange grey silty sand.
- 2.1.3 The water table on site was very high, with water collecting in a number of trenches and all the excavated features.

2.2 Trench 1

2.2.1 Two north-northwest to south-southeast aligned ditches and a large shallow pit were seen toward the western end of the trench. No datable finds were collected from the features but their fill types suggested they were not likely to be medieval/post-medieval. One of these features (7) was vertical-sided and flat-based and may have been butt ending at the northern edge of the trench. It had the appearance of a large beamslot.

2.3 Trench 2

2.3.1 Three post-medieval intercutting quarry pits were identified in the trench. These truncated the possible continuation of one of the two ditches seen in Trench 1. Finds from the intercutting pits included fragments of 19th century brick, glazed pottery, animal bone and an iron nail.

2.4 Trench 3

2.4.1 This trench was seen to contain the most dense level of archaeology. The southernmost end of the trench contained four intercutting post-medieval quarry pits, which contained 19th century brick fragments. Five ditches running on three separate alignments were seen across the rest of the trench. Four of these, on two perpendicular alignments, appeared to be part of a post-medieval paddock/drainage system: the fifth ditch bordered the area of quarry pitting. Finds recovered from these features included animal bone and fragments of Cambridge white brick.

2.5 Trench 4

2.5.1 A single, shallow sub-rectangular pit was seen at the southern end of Trench 4. The pit contained animal bone, fired clay and a single fire cracked flint.

2.6 Trench 5

2.6.1 Trench 5 was devoid of archaeology.

2.7 Trench 6

2.7.1 A wide and shallow north-south aligned ditch was seen running through the trench. Several sherds of Later Iron Age flint-tempered pottery were collected from the fill. To the immediate south of this was a group of seven postholes and a small vertical-sided

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pit. No finds were recovered from the postholes but they appeared to be part of a posthole structure. Their fills were not post-medieval/modern.

2.8 Finds Summary

2.8.1 Artefacts dating from the Iron Age through to the post-medieval period were collected during the archaeological works. A table of finds is listed below:

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3 DISCUSSION AND CONCLUSIONS

- 3.1.1 The development area is situated immediately adjacent to Car Dyke, therefore archaeology of a Roman origin was anticipated at the site. Trenches 1 and 2 were positioned over the ploughed out remains of the bank of the dyke so as to target potential buried soils beneath the bank. No finds of Roman date were identified, however the two ditches (one a potential beamslot) recorded in Trench 1 run parallel with Car Dyke and have the potential to be related to its construction or use.
- 3.1.2 Archaeological features uncovered on the eastern limit of site (in Trench 6) are considered to be of Iron Age or possibly of Anglo-Saxon date. The north-south aligned boundary ditch contained Later Iron Age pottery. The postholes immediately adjacent did not contain any datable finds and could therefore be contemporary with the ditch. However they could potentially be of a Saxon date, due to the site's close proximity to Anglo-Saxon settlement remains uncovered at Denny End Road 200m to the east where archaeological works revealed occupation dating to the early Anglo-Saxon period. The main feature uncovered was a shallow *grubenhaus* with associated pits and postholes. Also seen on this site was a three-sided post-built structure (Mortimer 1996).
- 3.1.3 Trenches 2 and 3 contain evidence for post-medieval quarrying for the extraction of gravel. Trench 3 also contains a number of ditches attributed to the post-medieval period, which run parallel with and perpendicular to the modern field boundary to the east.
- 3.1.4 Overall, the archaeological features revealed show evidence for how this site has been subject to use for a prolonged period of time from the Iron Age period onwards. The findings in Trenches 1 and 6 are considered to be of particular interest.
