ARCHAEOLOGICAL WATCHING BRIEF REPORT

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SUMMARY

In April 2002 Oxford Archaeology (OA) carried out an archaeological watching brief at the Jacqueline du Pres music room, St Hilda's College, Oxford (NGR SP 5220 0570). The work was commissioned by Basil Wyatt Construction in advance of the construction of a new foyer to the front of the building. The watching brief revealed no archaeological features or deposits.

1 INTRODUCTION

1.1 Location and scope of work

- In April 2002 Oxford Archaeology (OA) carried out an archaeological watching brief at the Jacqueline du Pres music room, St Hlida's College, Oxford (Fig. 1). The work was commissioned by Basil Wyatt Construction in respect of a planning application for new foyer at the front of building (Planning Application No. 01/0220 and 01/0884).
- 1.1.2 A project brief detailing the action for recording below ground impacts was set by Brain Durham, Oxford City Archaeologist.
- 1.1.3 OA prepared a Written Scheme of Investigation detailing how it would meet the requirements of the brief (OA, 2002).

1.2 Geology and topography

1.2.1 The geology of the site is Flood Plain Drift Geology, comprising Terrace and River Gravel's (sands and gravel's) above Oxford Clay. A geotechnical survey undertaken in 1998 found Drift geology to a depth of c. 2.7 m. Overlying this was modern made ground which comprised tarmac over crushed stone over sand, gravel and brick.

1.3 Archaeological and historical background

- 1.3.1 The archaeological background to the watching brief was prepared for the WSI for the project (OA, 2002) and is reproduced below.
- 1.3.2 The site is located c. 50 m east of the River Cherwell outside the historic core of Oxford, but within the ancient parish of Cowley. It is located in the eastern corner of St Hilda's College, adjacent to the College boundary wall.
- 1.3.3 A desk-based assessment concluded an uncertain potential for prehistoric, Roman and early medieval archaeology within the site, and a low potential for archaeology of the later medieval and post-medieval periods. A watching brief in 2000 here revealed 18th/19th century pottery and features associated with the construction of the school buildings (OA 2001). Other recent local fieldwork includes investigations at Magdelene College Sports Ground by TVAS in 2000 and at Cowley Place by John Moore Heritage Services in 2001 (OCC Project Brief, 2001).

2 PROJECT AIMS AND METHODOLOGY

2.1 **Aims**

- 2.1.1 To identify and record the presence/absence, extent, condition, quality and date of archaeological remains in the areas affected by the development.
- 2.1.2 To make available the results of the archaeological investigation.

2.2 Methodology

- 2.2.1 Prior to the ground work starting the excavation for a new fire path was carried out.

 This was with a JCB with a ditching bucket (Fig. 3). The ground was reduced by 0.3-5 m below the surface and filled with stone chippings.




Figure 2: Site Plan of Trenches and Section

- 2.2.2 The ground level was reduced by 0.2 m removing turf and a footpath. A 0.6 m wide and 0.9 m deep trench was excavated by JCB to re-route the local services. The foundation trench was then excavated along the front of the building (Fig. 2). This was 0.7 m wide and 0.6-0.9 m deep, and the area within reduced for the new floor.
- 2.2.3 All archaeological features were planned at a scale of 1:100 and where excavated their sections drawn at scales of 1:20. All excavated features were photographed using colour slide and black and white print film. A general photographic record of the work was made. Recording followed procedures detailed in the *OAU Fieldwork Manual* (ed D Wilkinson, 1992).

3 RESULTS

3.1 Description of deposits

3.1.1 The area strip and the trenches cut through topsoil of dark greyish brown silty sand (5) and a 0.3 m thick layer of stone chippings, which both overlay a subsoil of dark reddish brown silty sand (1) which was from 0.1 – 0.6 m in depth over the natural gravel (2) (Fig. 2). The subsoil and the gravel and been cut by a number of modern service trenches to the Jacqueline du Pres building and garden features.

3.2 Finds

3.2.1 No finds were recovered from the watching brief.

3.3 Palaeo-environmental remains

3.3.1 No samples were taken during the watching brief.

4 DISCUSSION AND CONCLUSIONS

4.1.1 No archaeological features or deposits were observed. The only activity being from landscaping for the garden, construction of the building and the installation of services to serve the Jacqueline du Pres building.





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Figure 1: Site location
