#### ARCHAEOLOGICAL WATCHING BRIEF

## BIBSWORTH MANOR, 80 EAST END ROAD, FINCHLEY, N3

#### 1 INTRODUCTION

- 1.1 The Oxford Archaeological Unit (OAU) conducted an archaeological watching brief at the north-western edge of the proposed development at 80 East End Road, Finchley, Greater London, (NGR TQ 2540 8992), on 22nd February 1993.
- 1.2 The development area is situated at the north-western arm of Bibsworth Manor, a Scheduled Ancient Monument. The history of the Medieval moated enclosure has already been outlined (eg Victoria County History 1980; Musgrove 1982; Bowsher 1991) and previous archaeological trenching has suggested that the line of the original moat may survive under the length of the proposed development (see attached plan).
- 1.3 The watching brief conducted by the OAU in February 1993 aimed to observe any archaeological material removed during the excavation of a foundation trench at the northern corner of the proposed development and to record any archaeological features disturbed during the machine stripping.

## 2 RESULTS

- 2.1 The machine-cut foundation trench measured 2 x 9 x 2 m in length, was 1.0 m wide and was excavated to a maximum depth of 1.0 m. Three distinct layers were recorded within the exposed section edges.
  - 1/1 Root sorted turf and top soil recorded to a depth of 0.15 m.
  - 1/2 A 0.35-0.5 m thick rubble deposit consisting of modern brick, mortar, post-medieval glass and corroded iron.
  - 1/3 A dense deposit of dark brown clay loam containing fragments of modern brick (20%), post-medieval glass (5%) and heavily corroded iron (2%). This layer was traced to the base of the foundation trench, but was not bottomed.
- 2.2 No archaeological features were recorded within the exposed section edges of the foundation trench.
- 2.3 All excavated topsoil was extensively examined by hand. No archaeological finds were recovered.

### 3. **CONCLUSION**

3.1 The area disturbed by the excavation of a foundation trench to the immediate northwest of the suggested line of Bibsworth Manor moated enclosure would appear to consist largely of made ground/modern brick rubble to a depth in excess of 1.0 m.
