Summary

On the 26th September 2009, OA East carried out an archaeological watching brief at Manor Farm, Grantchester (TL 4327 5523). The watching brief required the observation of topsoil removal over a 20m by 50m area prior to construction of an all weather riding surface. No archaeological features were observed and a small number of mostly post-medieval to modern artefacts were recovered.



1 GEOLOGY AND TOPOGRAPHY

1.1.1 The underlying natural geology consists of chalk and Gault clay and the area lies at c. 15.50m on a very gentle south- and east-facing slope with the River Cam some 380m due east.

2 ARCHAEOLOGICAL BACKGROUND

- 2.1.1 A series of cropmarks to the northwest, west and south of the site indicate Romano-British settlement archaeology, part of a known settlement, and possible villa site (MCB6279). At the centre of the village, 400m due north of the site, are the destroyed remains of an earthwork site in the grounds of the old village school. Partial investigated before their destruction revealed well preserved Early Saxon settlement remains including a *Grubenhaus*, and the bank and ditch of what may be a defended Middle Saxon enclosure.
- 2.1.2 The development lies c.220m south-southwest of the church and immediately south of the medieval moated site of Manor Farm (MCB1544 and DCB283), close to, but not within the core of the Medieval village. This part of the village was further developed through the early post-medieval period, the Old Vicarage, immediately to the north of Manor Farm, dating to the 17th century.

3 Methodology

- 3.1.1 The objective of this watching brief was to observe the removal of topsoil deposits over a 20m by 50m area.
- 3.1.2 The top soil was stripped by a 360° excavator with a toothless ditching bucket.
- 3.1.3 The Brief required that the removal of the top soil was observed by an experienced archaeologist.
- 3.1.4 Site conditions did not inhibit the observation of the works, the weather was dry and overcast.

4 Results

4.1 Topsoil strip

4.1.1 The topsoil was stripped to a depth varying between 0.35m and 0.50m, the depth of the deposit being greater at the east side of the stripped area and generally thinning to the west. A light greyish brown subsoil with chalk inclusions was observed underlying the topsoil across the entire area, however this material was not excavated. A land drain was seen running N-S within the stripped area.

4.2 Finds summary

- 4.2.1 All the finds retrieved came from the topsoil, the assemblage consists of five Late 19thC sherds, one late 18thC/ early 19thC sherd, an abraded 12-13thC sherd, and two undated clay pipe fragments. A few fragments of animal bone were collected and have been discarded.
- 5 DISCUSSION AND CONCLUSIONS
- 5.1.1 No archaeological features were observed during the strip (with the exception of a single land drain) and the finds recovered are of a quantity and type to be expected with the proximity of the village and the nearby farm buildings.
