ABINGDON - Ashville Trading Estate

The proofs of Mike Parrington's report on Ashville have now arrived from the Council for British Archaeology and these are being corrected. It is hoped that the monograph will be published in the autumn.

ABINGDON - Barton Court Farm

Bob Wilson reports that preliminary results of bone analysis indicate that the outer villa farmyard ditches have a greater proportion of cattle bones in them than in the inner ditches. Since the former are believed to be later in date, containing some Saxon pottery, this proportion of cattle remains contrasts with the high proportions of sheep and pig bones in the grubenhauser pits. Interpretation will not be easy.

ABINGDON - Stert Street

Charlotte Harding, an In-service trainee working with the Unit has been drawing small finds from this site and paging up pottery. This will make the Stert Street report substantially complete.

ABINGDON - West St. Helen Street

Geoff Moores, of the Abingdon Archaeological and Historical Society, and Bob Wilson, report that despite fit fall help with digging a second trench has been started to find more about the extent of the post-medieval buildings and to excavate deeper than the architect specifications allowed for the first trench. The earliest building appears to be of later date rather than as early as the sixteenth century as first reported.

ABINGDON - Wilsham Road

At the request of local societies, the Oxfordshire Archaeological Unit held a two-day training school in excavation techniques on the 26th/27th June. The response for this course was less than had been expected and only the Didcot, Thame and Lewknor Societies were represented. The excavation comprised an exploratory trench through each of two circular cropmarks threatened by future housing development and the conclusion of the school was that they were Bronze Age barrows. The course illustrated the type and size of task that can be usefully tackled by a local group under the guidance of one of the members who has obtained a basic training in the techniques involved.

CHALGROVE

Excavation supervised by Richard Chambers has begun on the moated site in the centre of Chalgrove. In the first week walls, floors, an oven, and an open hearth belonging to a kitchen range have been recorded. Work will continue for the next couple of months on this site which regionally is an important one. Excavation, mainly at weekends, is entirely by volunteers and help would be greatly appreciated. COMBE - Combe Mill, Beam Engine

The mill is a sawmill on the Blenheim Estates of the Duke of Marlborough and houses a small rotative mill beam engine dating from 1852, which has been restored to working order by a group of enthusiasts. The engine was originally used as an auxiliary source of power for the mill, the primary source being a waterwheel, but before restoration began in 1969 had lain idle for well over 60 years.

It is now steamed and shown to the public on selected weekends each year, and on these occasions it is usual to have other attractions at the mill, such as a blacksmith at work on the forge, carved furniture making and a variety of static and working exhibits. The waterwheel survives and may be inspected, but unfortunately is not in working order.

HARDWICK
